CORNELIUS DEPUTIES ARREST MASKED PIRATE BURGLAR

April 10 - Deputies serving the City of Cornelius arrested Sean Robert Tait in connection with a burglary that happened in July of 2018 at the Last Lap on 1515 North Adair Street in Cornelius. During the burglary, a safe was stolen with more than \$4,000 cash inside, and the suspect was disguised in a pirate mask that included a fake eye patch, parrot and beard. Mr. Tate was lodged in the Washington County Jail on charges of burglary in the second degree, theft in the first degree. unauthorized use of a motor vehicle, and possession of a stolen vehicle.

ALOHA HIGH SCHOOL TEACHER ARRESTED IN BEAVERTON

April 18 - Timothy Yee, 30, was arrested following an investigation that he had sent sexually explicit photos and videos to an underage student via social media. Mr. Yee was employed as a health teacher and wrestling coach at Aloha High School. Detectives contacted the Beaverton School District, who cooperated fully with investigators and immediately placed Mr. Yee on leave. On April 17, he was arrested and booked into the Multnomah County Jail on charges of luring a minor and using a child in display of sexually explicit conduct.

SHERIFF'S OFFICE 2018 NUMBERS AND HIGHLIGHTS

Deputies responded to 122,931 calls for service. Roughly 1 in 10 (11,832) were priority level 1 and 2 calls (sirens on, lights flashing).

48% of the time deputies responded to priority level 1 and 2 calls within 5 minutes. 64% within 7 minutes.

Deputies stopped motorists 28,899 times. 69% resulted in a warning.

The Mental Health Response Team directly responded to or supported 4.676 calls for service.

K-9s were deployed 619 times for tracking and 347 times for narcotics searches, resulting in 80 captures and 70 pounds of drugs recovered.

18,412 bookings were processed in the Washington County Jail.

1,375 inmates spent 34,985 hours participating in jail programs. 41 inmates earned their GED.

Court Security and Transportation Unit escorted 6,172 inmates to court, and drove 40,678 miles while transporting inmates to and from the jail.

Detectives received 2,367 reports from the Department of Human Services about child abuse.

MAN SENTENCED TO 50 YEARS ON SEX ABUSE CHARGES

April 5 - A Washington County jury found Bryon Lloyd Akins guilty of 14 counts of sexual abuse. He was sentenced to 50 years in prison. Detective Rookhuyzen began investigating Akins in August of 2018 after receiving a report of possible abuse involving two young girls. Investigators determined the abuse happened multiple times over the span of at least two years. Akins denied the allegations but was found guilty after a three-day jury trial.

FOUR TEENS INJURED IN EARLY MORNING CRASH

April 21 - Deputies responded to a head-on injury crash near the intersection of SW Tile Flat Road and SW Grabhorn Road. Tualatin Valley Fire & Rescue arrived with deputies and began extricating three passengers from an Audi. Deputies learned the driver of a Toyota Camry lost control of his vehicle and collided head-on with the Audi. Four teenager passengers, all of whom were riding in the Audi, were transported to area hospitals.

DRUG TURN-IN KEEPS MEDS OFF STREETS, OUT OF WATER

April 27 - As part of the Drug Enforcement Administration's National Take Back Day, WCSO collected 410 pounds of unwanted prescription drugs in Cedar Mill and Aloha. This special event aims to provide a safe, convenient and responsible way to dispose of prescription drugs, ultimately helping to reduce prescription drug abuse, accidental overdoses and environmental harm. The next event is planned for late October.


