# Public Hearing

Stephanie Jones, Chair of the Policy Advisory Board opened the public hearing at approximately 7:01am. All PAB members, staff and members of the community introduced themselves for the record. Stephanie informed all participants that this public meeting will be recorded.

Stephanie began the public hearing by reviewing the purpose of the hearing.

The hearing is the second of two public hearings for the 2024 Annual Action Plan for the jurisdictions including Washington County and the Cities of Beaverton and Hillsboro. The purpose of today's public hearing is both to outline for the public the funded activities for the 2024 program year for the Community Development Block Grant Program, the HOME Investment Partnerships Program and the Emergency Solutions Grant Program, as well as provide the public with an opportunity to comment on the activities and programs proposed for the upcoming program year. These comments will be included with the final version of the Action Plan document provided to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development when it is submitted this May.

The Action Plan document highlights the activities in the fifth year of the 2020-2024 Consolidated Plan, the strategic planning document that provides a framework for the County in targeting critical but limited federal resources to the highest priority needs. The 2024 Action Plan not only highlights these activities for this program year but also helps to shape how Washington County and the Cities of Beaverton and Hillsboro are progressing in meeting the five-year goals in this fifth year of the five-year strategic planning period.

# **PUBLIC TESTIMONY**

Following your endorsement, this document will be sent to the County Board of Commissioners for its approval on April 23rd. The document will then be sent to the Department of Housing and Urban Development as the County's application for the federal funds.

## 3. APPROVAL OF Substantial Amendment to FY 2019 Action Plan

Kelvin Valdovinos reviewed the process the PAB went through to allocate these funds. The Office of Community Development (OCD) allocated \$500,000 of the HOME-ARP funds towards Supportive Services, approved by the HOME-ARP allocation plan. OCD also has roughly \$140,000 in unallocated CDBG-CV funds available, which can be used for similar services. Family Promise of Greater Washington County (FPGWC), if interested, would be awarded the CDBG-CV funds if compliance factors (CDBG-CV) allow for same the supportive services. In addition, \$10,000 in HOME-ARP Supportive Services funds would be awarded with CDBG-CV funds. CDBG-CV funding would provide half of FPGWC HOME-ARP Supportive Service request.

In November 2023, the Policy Advisory Board approved \$140,000 in CDBG-CV funds to be awarded to FPGWC to be used for supportive services.

This new CDBG-CV project has been added to the FY2019 Action Plan. As a result of this addition, the Washington County Office of Community Development (OCD) is required to provide a substantial amendment to the 2019 Action Plan.

## 5. Consolidated Plan Process update

On March 15, 2024, Washington County, the City of Beaverton, and the City of Hillsboro held a kickoff event for the 2025-2029 Consolidated Plan at the Hillsboro Civic Center. Sixty-five individuals representing 31 non-profit organizations and 7 local government entities were in attendance. They heard talks from the following speakers:

- Shannon Wilson, Washington County office of Community Development
- Lynn Wallis, Oregon Employment Department
- Emily Lieb, Metro Affordable Housing
- Jes Larson, Washington County Department of Housing Services
- Jilian Saurage Felton, Community Partners for Affordable Housing

After a break, the larger group divided into smaller work groups to have conversations around Public Infrastructure/Facilities, Affordable Housing/Homeownership, and Public Services. We had great conversations during this time which will be shared with the consultant for the creation of the goals and objectives for our 2025-2029 Consolidated Plan.

This event also launched both a community survey that we are seeking input from the entire community regarding housing and community development needs, and a provider survey seeking input from community providers on processes for our programs. In the coming months we will have continued community engagement throughout the Consolidated Planning process.



## 6. CDBG Timeliness update

This timeliness update is a follow up from the memo provided to your Board in December 2023. Washington County Office of Community Development has met HUD's timely performance requirement for Program Year 2023-24. This has been confirmed informally by HUD staff and will be formally evaluated on May 4, 2024.

Each year HUD examines the timely performance (also known as 'timeliness') of entitlement jurisdictions in implementing the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program. In accordance with federal regulations (24 CFR 570.902), entitlement jurisdictions must have a balance no greater than one and one-half (1.5) times its annual grant. For 2020-2021, the timely performance requirement was waived due to implications from the COVID-19 pandemic. This evaluation resumed in 2022. Unfortunately, our Office did not meet timeliness requirements in 2022 or 2023 so our team has been working hard with our funded partners to meet the requirement this year. If our office does not meet this requirement, we face potential sanctions from HUD on our annual allocation of Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds.

Specifically, staff have been working to get large infrastructure and facility projects under contract and under construction. These awards were not able to be expended quickly due to staffing and supply chain issues during and after the COVID-19 pandemic. Key large public facilities and public infrastructure projects now completed and underway include:

## 7. Miscellaneous and Announcements


