

My grandparents settled in Cornelius as farm workers during the 90's. I had the opportunity to grow up in Cornelius in a multigenerational household. I have lived in Washington County my whole life, and as I connected with my community, I realized many of our long-time Cornelius residents have difficulty understanding the functions of the city council — together, we can break this generational barrier for our residents.

My priorities are:

Building a safe and stable community for working families:

- Ensure city meetings and town halls are accessible for working family schedules.
- Partner with service providers to increase access to mental health services.
- Leverage public investments in sustainable safe transportation methods, including expansion of public transportation routes, sidewalks, and bike lanes.

- Partner with local resource centers and community organizations to use more communications channels to promote community engagement opportunities and solicit feedback on city events.

- Create professional development opportunities in collaboration with our community partners.
- Foster communal projects with our Cornelius Historical Society to preserve the heritage of our city and residents.

Dear Neighbors:

My wife and I have lived in Durham over 18 years and are delighted to be here. My priorities as a city council member will be:

Use Metro Grant to Improve Durham Park. Durham was awarded \$310,665 from Metro's Regional Parks and Nature Bond. I will work toward using these funds to extend the northern Durham Park trail to the new Durham Heights development.

Update Durham's Tree Protection Laws. Trees felled in recent storms devastated several houses and nearly caused serious injuries. I will vote in favor of revising our tree protection laws to allow removal of large trees at risk of being uprooted by high winds.

More Transparency. There is no published contact information for any of Durham's elected officials, even our mayor. I will advocate for publishing email addresses (with a city URL) for our leaders. Also, well before the date when candidates may file, we should publicize the city council seats up for election along with filing instructions. The average tenure for our city council members is 12 years. More turnover will bring fresh ideas, new perspectives and increased ownership in our city.

Improve Outreach. I will work to upgrade Durham's website to allow online registration of names and email addresses. This mailing list can be used to provide current online information on activities and events. Eventually, we can transition to an online newsletter, like Tuplatin.

Preserve Durham's Natural Areas. The city recently felled 16 trees in Durham Park and the forest between Rivendell and Willowbottom. I oppose this practice and will work to preserve our natural areas.

I served on the Forest Grove City Council for 22 years, from 2000 until 2022. We did a lot. We improved our partnership with Pacific University that resulted in an improved Lincoln Park and brought about the addition of Thatcher Park. We also purchased land for an eastside park. We worked with Washington County in improving traffic with the extension of David Hill Road. We played a major role in building roundabouts on Highway 47 that made that north-south state highway safer. We also relied on our community to develop a Public Arts Commission recognizing the importance of such art to our community identity. We purchased the Times-Litho Lot for development into the Jesse Quinn housing as part of downtown revitalization. During the pandemic, we helped keep businesses alive through low interest loans and worked with residents by reducing and/or postponing utility payments. In providing electrical power to the community, Forest Grove Power and Light was able to build a redundant system thus increasing reliability.

There is, however, much to do. 

You are qualified to register to vote in Oregon if you can answer yes to the following questions:

- ✓ Are you a resident of Oregon?
- ✓ Are you a US citizen?
- ✓ Are you at least 16 years of age?

If you are 16 years of age, you will not receive a ballot until an election occurs on or after your 18th birthday.

How to register

Register to vote online at **oregonvotes.gov** or pick up a voter registration card at any of the following places:

- The Secretary of State's Office
- Some state agencies such as the Division of Motor Vehicles
- A voter registration drive
- Some locations of the US Postal Service
- Libraries

After completing your registration card, mail or bring it to our office in person.

The deadline for new registrations and party changes is 21 days prior to Election Day.



Fill in no more than one oval per column and no more than one oval per row.




- Fill one oval in the Rank 1 column for the candidate you like the most.
- If you have a candidate that you like second best, fill in one oval in the Rank 2 column for that candidate, and so on.
- You are allowed to rank up to six candidates, but you can vote for only one if you prefer. Ranking other candidates does not harm your Rank 1 choice.
- To write in a candidate, write the candidate's name on the line provided and fill in the oval for the rank of your choice.

Whether you are voting in a contest for a single winner (such as Mayor of Portland) or multiple winners (such as for Portland City Councilors), the ballot layout and steps to vote will be the same.



Skipped Rankings




When filling out your ballot, if you skip over a rank column, your next highest ranking will be elevated to take its place in the counting process.

If you rank a single candidate multiple times, only the highest ranking is accepted and each lower ranking for the same candidate is ignored as if you had skipped that ranking.


Overvotes







Measure No. 3-612

Ballot Title

Charter Amendment: Enhances Park and Natural Area Protection

Question: Shall City Charter be amended to add additional protections for parks and other green spaces and natural areas?

Summary: This measure would amend the charter by the adoption of a number of protections for parks, natural areas, and green spaces owned or controlled by the City without a vote of citizens of Rivergrove.

Those protections include:

- Prohibiting the sale, lease or transfer of such properties;
- Prohibiting development of change In use of such properties;
- Prohibiting the installation of communication or cell towers;
- Designating the boat ramp as a park and natural area and setting hours of use for the facility;
- Requiring the maintenance of parks, natural areas, and green
- Allowing for the change in use of such areas in emergencies;
- Allowing the installation of public sewer facilities in such areas;
- Setting forth enforcement requirements and penalties; and
- defining certain terms as used by the measure.

This measure would add these protections to the Rivergrove City Charter and any change to the measures would also have to be made through a charter change.

These amendments would remain in force, unless a modification was approved through the same charter change procedure, ensuring transparency and citizen involvement.

In summary, the purpose of this charter amendment is to protect Rivergrove's parks, natural spaces, and green spaces and ensure responsible management by the City.

Explanatory Statement

The proposed Charter Amendment would change the Rivergrove City Charter by adding protections for parks, natural areas, and green spaces. These protections would apply to properties owned or controlled by the City by requiring a vote from Rivergrove citizens before the City could take certain actions regarding City owned parks, natural areas, and green spaces.

The proposed protections cover properties owned or controlled by the City of Rivergrove and include:

- Property Transactions: The amendment would prohibit the sale, lease, or transfer of these areas without a vote from the citizens of Rivergrove.
- Development Restrictions: It would prevent any development or change in use of these areas without a vote of the citizens of Rivergrove.
- Communication Towers: Installation of communication or cell towers would be prohibited.
- Boat Ramp Designation: The boat ramp would be designated as a park and natural area, with specific usage hours would be set in the Charter.
- Maintenance Requirement: The City would be required to maintain these parks, natural areas, and green spaces.
- Emergency Use: In emergencies, there could be temporary changes in use for up to 48 hours and possibly up to 45 days if a super majority of the City Council approved.
- Public Sewer Facilities: allows the installation of public sewer facilities.
- Enforcement and Penalties: The amendment outlines enforcement rules and penalties for violations of the Charter amendment.
- Definition of Terms: Certain terms used in the measure would be defined.

City of Lake Oswego

Measure No. 3-618

Ballot Title

Allows road safety project, driveway realignment on specific park property.

Question: Shall Lake Oswego amend the Charter to allow Clackamas County to improve road safety using 0.4 acres of Stevens Meadows?

Summary: The City owns Stevens Meadows, a park of about 28 acres outside City limits in Clackamas County. The County is responsible for Stafford and Childs Roads adjacent to the park.

The County has determined improvements to the Stafford/Childs intersection are necessary to ease congestion and reduce injuries from accidents. The road improvements, which will be paid for and constructed by the County, will reduce crashes, ease traffic congestion, and create bike lanes and safe pedestrian paths. The County estimates the road improvements will decrease the crashes by 88% at the intersection. The County needs to use about 0.2 acres for these road improvements. The project will also realign an existing gravel driveway used for park maintenance, affecting an area of about 0.2 acres.

The City Charter prohibits the City from allowing roads on Stevens Meadows. If adopted, this measure would amend the Charter, allowing the City to enable County use of up to 0.4 acres of Stevens Meadows for the limited purposes of public safety road improvements and driveway realignment.

Explanatory Statement

The City of Lake Oswego owns Stevens Meadows, a park of about 28 acres outside city limits in Clackamas County. The County is responsible for maintaining and improving Stafford and Childs Roads adjacent to the park.

In 2018 Clackamas County conducted a Federal Highway Administration road safety audit that revealed problems with the Stafford/Childs intersection, including limited intersection visibility, rear-end crashes involving injuries, high speed turning, and heavy traffic without many gaps.

Between 2020 and 2024, Clackamas County designed different alternatives for the intersection and involved the public and other stakeholders. After this public engagement process the County finalized and funded a design requiring the construction of a roundabout at the Stafford/Childs intersection.

The County designed the project to reduce crashes, ease traffic congestion, and create bike lanes and safer pedestrian paths. The County estimates that road improvements could decrease fatal and injury crashes by 88%. The project also includes plans to mitigate potential environmental impacts of the project through work on the land around Pecan Creek, a fish bearing stream directly adjacent to Stevens Meadows.

The County needs to use about 0.2 acres of Stevens Meadows for the road improvements. The project will also realign an existing gravel driveway on the Meadows used to maintain the park, affecting another area of about 0.2 acres.

In 2021, Lake Oswego voters passed an amendment to the City Charter limiting the types of development allowed on 15 City-owned parks, including Stevens Meadows. The Charter directs the City to prohibit anyone, including Clackamas County, from building a road or redeveloping the gravel driveway on Stevens Meadows.

Measure 3-618 would amend the Charter, allowing the City to authorize the County to use up to 0.4 acres of Stevens Meadows for the limited purposes of public safety road improvements and driveway realignment.

If the measure is adopted:

- The Charter would be amended, allowing the City to authorize the County to use up to 0.4 acres of Stevens Meadows for the limited purposes of public safety road improvements and driveway realignment.
- The City Charter will continue prohibiting development on the rest of Stevens Meadows.
- The City will continue to manage the park in accordance with the City Charter.
- The County would be responsible for funding and constructing the Stafford/Childs Road project with County funds.
- Measure 3-618 would not increase City taxes.

If the measure is not adopted:

- The Charter will continue to prohibit road construction and driveway realignment on all of Stevens Meadows.
- The City would not authorize the County to use 0.4 acres at the corner of Stafford Road/ Childs Road for the road improvement project or driveway realignment.
- The City will continue to manage the park in accordance with the City Charter.

City of Lake Oswego

Measure No. 3-619

Ballot Title

Prohibits psilocybin businesses within the City of Lake Oswego.

Question: Shall the City of Lake Oswego prohibit psilocybin service centers and the manufacture of psilocybin products within the City?

Summary: State law authorizes the manufacturing, transportation, delivery, sale, and purchase of psilocybin, the psychedelic drug found in certain mushrooms, in Oregon. A city may "opt-out" by adopting an ordinance prohibiting the establishment of licensed psilocybin product manufacturers and/or psilocybin service centers within their boundaries. A city that "opts-in" may also adopt local time, place, and manner restrictions on psilocybin product manufacturers and/or psilocybin service centers that are in addition to those already imposed by state law.

The City adopted an ordinance prohibiting the establishment of psilocybin product manufacturers and psilocybin service center operators (collectively, "psilocybin facilities") within the City. State law requires that this ordinance must be approved by the voters before it may take effect. The City Council also adopted an ordinance imposing local time, place, and manner restrictions on psilocybin facilities in addition to those already imposed by state law

Approval of this measure would prohibit psilocybin facilities within the City. Rejection of the measure would allow psilocybin facilities within the City subject to state and local restrictions.

Explanatory Statement

This measure asks whether or not to allow businesses related to psilocybin, a substance found in certain mushrooms, to operate in Lake Oswego.

In 2020, Oregon passed a law (Measure 109) allowing psilocybin to be made, delivered, and used in licensed facilities across the state. These businesses are called "psilocybin-related businesses." However, the state also lets local governments, like the one in Lake Oswego, decide if they want to ban these businesses within their city limits. A ban must be approved by the city's voters. The Lake Oswego City Council has adopted an ordinance prohibiting the establishment of psilocybin-related businesses within the city and, as a result, has referred this measure to the voters.

The Lake Oswego City Council has also adopted local rules for psilocybin-related businesses on top of what state law requires. The local rules are aimed at protecting children in childcare facilities close to psilocybin businesses, distancing marijuana and psilocybin businesses, and clarifying zoning between mixed-use and residential. For detailed information about the local restrictions, visit https://www.ci.oswego.or.us/all-projects and in the "Search" box enter LU 23-0001.

If you vote "Yes" on this measure, psilocybin-related businesses will continue to be banned in Lake Oswego. If you vote "No," these businesses will be allowed, but they will need to follow state and local Lake Oswego rules.

Ballot Title

Amends Charter: Deletes outdated, redundant requirements to approve utility franchises.

Question: Shall Charter be amended to streamline Council approval of utility franchise agreements and remove outdated, burdensome and redundant requirements?

Summary: The Charter Commission proposed a measure to streamline the approval of franchise agreements, which authorize a utility to use City streets to provide residents with utility services.

Currently, City Council must approve franchises using a lengthy and outdated process described in Chapter 10, Article 2 of the Charter.

If the measure is approved, the following requirements would be deleted:

- · Redundant filing with Auditor
- Objection process
- · Publication of lengthy franchise in newspaper
- Extended time between reading of ordinance to approve franchise
- Extended effective date
- Written acceptance by franchisee

Instead, Council would grant franchises by ordinance, in accordance with standard ordinance publication, public testimony, adoption and effective date provisions in Charter and code. Other provisions.

The City Budget Office determined the measure has no direct financial impact.

Explanatory Statement

The volunteer Charter Commission recommended amending the City Charter to streamline Council approval of utility franchise agreements by removing outdated, burdensome and redundant requirements. A utility franchise agreement authorizes a utility to use City streets to provide residents with utility services.

Currently, Chapter 10, Article 2 of the Charter requires City Council to use a lengthy and outdated process that can take over six months to complete. For example, the entire franchise – which can run 25 pages or longer – must be published in the newspaper.

Under the Commission's recommendation, outdated and redundant requirements specific to franchise agreements would be deleted. Instead, Council would grant franchises using its standard ordinance process. The standard process includes ordinance publication, public testimony, and adoption and effective date provisions located in Charter and code.

Question: Shall Charter be amended to add Independent Portland Elections Commission to oversee public financing of elections, other election-related programs?

Summary: The Charter Commission proposed a measure to add the Independent Portland Elections Commission to Chapter 3 of the Charter.

Currently, an Elections Commission is established by code, which can be amended by City Council. If the measure passes, the Elections Commission would be added to the Charter, which means the Election Commission provisions can only be amended by an affirmative vote of a majority of voters.

The Elections Commission will continue to be responsible for implementing the City's public financing of elections as provided by ordinance and, if the measure passes, any other election or campaign finance-related law or program delegated by the Council or Auditor.

The Elections Commission will continue to consist of nine City residents appointed by the Mayor and confirmed by Council. Under the measure, the Elections Commission will notify the Mayor and Council of funds required for the public financing of elections program and other duties. The Council continues to determine the Elections Commission's budget. Other provisions.

The City Budget Office determined the measure has no direct financial impact.

Explanatory Statement

The volunteer Charter Commission recommended amending the City Charter to add the Independent Portland Elections Commission.

Currently, the Independent Portland Elections Commission is established by code, which can be amended by City Council.

Under the Commission's recommendation, the Independent Portland Elections Commission would be added to the Charter, which can only be amended by an affirmative vote of a majority of voters. Currently, the Elections Commission only implements the City's public financing of elections program. Under the Commission's recommendation, the Elections Commission would also be able to implement any other election or campaign finance-related law or program delegated to the Commission by the Council or Auditor. The Elections Commission will continue to consist of nine City residents appointed by the Mayor and confirmed by Council. City Council will continue to determine and provide the Election Commission's budget.

Our organizations work for healthier democracy, voter rights, getting big money out of politics, and holding powerful politicians accountable. We are non-partisan. All voters deserve free and fair elections.

Portland must reform how it oversees elections and campaigns.

Currently, enforcement of Portland's rules on political campaign funding and disclosures is split among various city offices, leading to confusion. And those offices are led by elected politicians, which is a conflict of interest: Those politicians make decisions that can affect which candidates win or lose.

Measure 26-250 would stop those conflicts of interest and end bureaucratic confusion. It would transfer implementation of the Small Donor Elections Program to a new Independent Portland Elections Commission (IPEC), with members representing different communities and free from conflicts of interest. It is a conflict of interest if the people who run for office also implement the rules.

Portland needs one permanent home for all election-related programs that is efficient and free of potential conflicts of interest: the Independent Portland Elections Commission.

Our organizations stand up to big special interests and entrenched power. That is why we urge you to vote for a modern and trusted elections system.

Ballot Title

Amends Charter: Updates authority to manage parks, sewers and stormwaters.

Question: Shall Charter be amended to update City authority regarding recreational and natural areas (defined), sewers and stormwaters?

Summary: Charter Commission proposed measure to update City authority, last amended in 1966, to manage recreational and natural areas, sewers and stormwaters.

If measure passes:

- Charter Section 12-101, describing parks management, would add "recreational and natural areas" as defined term to mean parks, playgrounds, forests, wetlands and human-built, natural facilities. Remaining language would be streamlined.
- A section would be added to City's specific powers in Charter Section 2-105(a) clarifying that City may perform sewer, stormwater management – including protecting, restoring, remediating, altering, improving, expanding, filling, grading, or managing flow –in channels, riparian areas, floodplains, waterfronts, lakes, ponds, wetlands, other waters, natural systems, constructed equivalents.
- Charter Section 11-301 would be amended to clarify that storm drainage may use natural systems, constructed equivalents.
- Charter Section 11-302 would be amended to streamline language, last updated in 1970, related to service charges deposited into Sewage Disposal Fund. Charter will continue to require Council to spend Fund only on uses "reasonably related" to sewage, stormwater conveyance, disposal and purification.

Other provisions.

City Budget Office determined measure has no direct financial impact.

Explanatory Statement

The volunteer Charter Commission recommended amending the City Charter to update the City's authority to protect and manage parks and to manage sewers and stormwaters. Descriptions of the City's roles were last updated in 1966.

Currently, the City's role to protect and manage parks is described in Charter Section 12-101.

Under the Commission's recommendation, Charter Section 12-101 would be amended to define "recreational and natural areas" as parks, playgrounds, forests, wetlands and human-built or natural facilities. The remaining language would be streamlined to increase readability.

Currently, the City's sewer and stormwater management role is described in Charter Section 11-301 and Section 11-302 describes the City's process, last amended in 1970, to fix, collect and deposit service charges into the Sewage Disposal Fund.

Under the Commission's recommendation, a new section would be added to the City's specific powers in Charter Section 2-105(a) to clarify that the City may perform sewer and stormwater management – including protecting, restoring, remediating, altering, improving, expanding, filling, grading, or managing flow – in channels, riparian areas, floodplains, waterfronts, lakes, ponds, wetlands and other waters, natural systems or constructed equivalents. Existing Charter Section 11-301 would be amended to clarify that storm drainage may include the use of natural systems or constructed equivalents. Existing Charter Section 11-302 would be amended to streamline language

related to service charges. The Charter will continue to require City Council to spend all charges deposited into the Sewage Disposal Fund on uses "reasonably related" to sewage and stormwater conveyance, disposal and purification.

Ballot Title

Amends Charter: Deletes vague, archaic and inconsistent language.

Question: Shall Charter be amended to delete vague, archaic language and use a consistent definition of "protected classes"?

Summary: The Charter Commission proposed a measure to delete vague, archaic and inconsistent language in the Charter.

If the measure passes, the following language in the Charter would be amended:

- Delete Charter Section 2-105(a)(50) to remove vague, archaic language to "prohibit persons from roaming the streets at unseasonable hours". Deleting this section of the City's specific powers would not impair the City's general powers and authority to protect and support public health and safety.
- Delete vague, archaic language to regulate "offensive" businesses in Charter Section 2-105(a)(36). City would retain authority to regulate businesses that create or constitute a nuisance.
- Use consistent language to define "protected classes" as those classes protected "under local ordinance, or state or federal law" in Charter Chapters 2, 4 and 12.
- Replace "disability" with "incapacity" in Charter Chapter 2 to reflect the fact that disabled residents may serve as City officials.

The City Budget Office determined the measure has no direct financial impact.

Explanatory Statement

The volunteer Charter Commission recommended amending the City Charter to delete vague, archaic and inconsistent language.

Currently, Charter Section 2-105(a)(50) lists as one of the City's specific powers the right to "prohibit persons from roaming the streets at unseasonable hours". Under the Commission's recommendation, this vague and archaic language would be deleted. Deleting this section of the City's specific powers would not impair the City's general powers and authority to protect and support public health and safety.

Currently, Charter Section 2-105(a)(36) authorizes the City to regulate "businesses which are offensive or may create or constitute a nuisance. . ." Under the Commission's recommendation, the vague term "offensive" would be deleted and the City would retain authority to regulate businesses that create or constitute a nuisance.

Currently, Charter Chapters 2, 4 and 12 define "protected classes", but the definitions have small inconsistencies. Under the Commission's recommendation, a consistent definition of "protected classes" – those classes protected "under local ordinance, or state or federal law" – would be used throughout the Charter.

Currently, the term "disability" is used in Charter Chapter 2 to describe when a City official may be unable to perform official duties. Under the Commission's recommendation, the term "disability" would be replaced with "incapacity" to reflect the fact that disabled residents may serve as City officials.

Ballot Title

Amends Charter: Removes citywide vote requirement for mandatory building weatherization.

Question: Shall Charter be amended to allow City to mandate weatherization of structures built before 1979 without a citywide vote?

Summary: The Charter Commission proposed a measure to delete Charter Section 1-108 and allow the City to mandate weatherization of pre-1979 structures without a citywide vote.

Currently, the City cannot mandate weatherization for any structure built before September 1, 1979, unless Council refers the weatherization mandate to voters. This limit was added to the Charter in 1980 through a vote on an initiative petition.

If the measure is approved, the City would be able to mandate building weatherization without referring the mandate to voters.

The City Budget Office determined the measure has no direct financial impact.

Explanatory Statement

The volunteer Charter Commission recommended amending the City Charter to remove the citywide vote requirement for mandatory building weatherization.

Currently, the City cannot mandate weatherization for any structure built before September 1, 1979, unless the City Council refers the weatherization mandate to the voters. This limit was added to the Charter in 1980 through an initiative petition.

Under the Commission's recommendation, Charter Section 1-108 would be deleted in its entirety. Deletion of the citywide vote requirement would allow the City to more efficiently require energy-efficient weatherization of buildings within the City.

Ballot Title

Advisory Vote on Fluoridation of Hillsboro's Drinking Water

Question: Are you in favor of Hillsboro fluoridating its drinking water system?

Summary: This is an advisory ballot measure, which is not binding, to determine if voters in Hillsboro would like to add fluoride to the City's drinking water system. Hillsboro supplies drinking water to most City residents and businesses and to wholesale customers including other municipalities. A portion of City residents and businesses receive water from Tualatin Valley Water District

(TVWD). Hillsboro currently does not add fluoride to its drinking water supply, but TVWD fluoridates drinking water for its Hillsboro customers.

This advisory measure asks voters if Hillsboro should add fluoride to its drinking water system for the water customers served by the City. Opinions regarding the benefits and hazards of fluoridating water are varied. Therefore, the City wants voters to provide their preference whether or not to fluoridate the City's drinking water system.

A yes vote would advise the City to take steps to add fluoride to the water system. A no vote would advise the City not to add fluoride to the water system.

Explanatory Statement

The City of Hillsboro provides drinking water to most of its residents and businesses as well as to wholesale customers located outside of the City, including other municipalities. A portion of the City's residents and businesses receive water from the Tualatin Valley Water District (TVWD). Currently, the City does not add fluoride to the water provided to its customers. On the other hand, TVWD does add fluoride to the water it supplies to its customers located in Hillsboro.

The City's water system is generally overseen by the Hillsboro Utilities Commission and the Hillsboro City Council. This measure is an advisory vote to request voter input on whether the City should add fluoride to its water system. This is a nonbinding vote, which will provide input to the Utilities Commission and the City Council on whether the voters prefer to add fluoride to Hillsboro's water system.

This measure was placed on the ballot by the Hillsboro City Council at the request of the Utilities Commission. The Utilities Commission has received a request from members of the public to add fluoride to the City's water system. Because opinions vary on the benefits and hazards of adding fluoride to drinking water, the City wanted to receive input from the voters before making a decision on whether to add fluoride to the City's water system. In addition, historically, this issue has been presented to the City's voters, and the Utilities Commission and City Council wanted to honor that past practice.

A yes vote would advise the City to take steps to add fluoride to the water system. If the City proceeds with fluoridation, it will take into account costs and applicable health standards to determine the appropriate methods and amounts of fluoride to add to the water system. A no vote would advise the City not to add fluoride to the water system.

Argument in Opposition

I first discovered the questions around artificial water fluoridation in 1978, when it came up for vote in Portland, Oregon. Conflicting claims started me wondering about what the evidence really was. I was fresh out of intensive training in scientific research methodology, with BS and MS degrees, so I made visits to the OHSU Medical School and Dental School libraries to take a look for myself. I quickly realized that there was strong evidence for concerns about the safety and effectiveness.

I was appalled at the mis-information that was being claimed by the pro-fluoridation side, so I joined the antifluoridation side. We soundly defeated the mandatory water fluoridation proposal in 1980. And again, in 2013.

Since 1980, newer scientific evidence shows the outdated practice is largely ineffective in protecting teeth. But even more alarming is strong evidence showing risk of serious harm to human brains: Lowering children's I.Q. and increasing attention disorders and other disabilities.

There has now been a seven-year legal action in **San Francisco Federal Court** to determine whether scientific evidence justifies the court to require the U.S. EPA to enforce drinking water laws that would **halt fluoridation in the U.S.** The hearing has been finished for several months, and the court is finalizing it's decision. The country is waiting to learn the court's decision.

Yet, again, fluoridation comes up to be voted on in Hillsboro, still promoted by the same forces promoting it since 1945, and still contrary to solid scientific evidence. We have been waiting way too long for government to follow scientific truth. Since 1945, in fact.

Soon we will have the federal court's decision.

Artificial water fluoridation is an out-of-date idea that keeps coming up again and again, only because misguided persons keep promoting it.

Not sure how to vote? I encourage you to check into the evidence for yourself.

I urge you to vote 'NO' on measure 34-338.

Argument in Opposition

Current science tells us fluoridation is not safe or effective at preventing tooth decay.

7 reasons vote NO vote on Measure 34-338:

- 1. Per the EPA, 90% of fluoride in drinking water is supplied from Fluorosilicic acid (FSA) or hydro fluorosilicate (HFS).
- Fluorosilicic acid and hydro fluorosilicate are toxic waste products from the fertilizer industry. The heating process utilized in the production of phosphate fertilizer releases hydrogen fluoride (HF) and silicon tetrafluoride (SiF4) gases, which are captured by vacuum evaporators. These gases are then condensed to a water-based solution of approximately 23% FSA.
- 3. Per the Material Safety Data sheets, the GHS-US Hazard Classification of FSA and HFS is: ACUTE TOXICITY (ORAL), Category 4, H302 Harmful if Swallowed.
- Many foods, beverages and medicines contain fluoride, including raisins, sports drinks, soft drinks, juices, coffee and tea. Additionally, fluoride is naturally occurring in most water sources in varying amounts.
- 5. There is no way to control the amount of fluoride ingested because it is contained in many foods and beverages. Adding fluoride to drinking water puts infants, athletes, people taking certain medications, and all of us at risk of excessive exposure.
- Excess ingestion of fluoride causes dental fluorosis which appears as mottled, weakened, and discolored tooth enamel.
- Current studies show that fluoride ingestion is linked to cancer, lower IQ, endocrine function, and immune function.

August 2024, "National Toxicology Program Monograph on the State of the Science Concerning Fluoride Exposure and Neurodevelopment and Cognition: A Systematic Review", concluded "higher estimated fluoride exposures (e.g., as in approximations of exposure such as drinking water fluoride concentrations that exceed the World Health Organization Guidelines for Drinking-water Quality of 1.5 mg/L of fluoride) are consistently associated with lower IQ in children."

Mirroring my Portland dental patients, CDC's "NHANES 2015-2016 Survey" reported a **70% nationwide prevalence of dental fluorosis.**

It's a contaminant and must be disposed of at a hazardous waste facility if not sold for fluoridation. It can contain both lead and arsenic. The EPA has determined there are no safe levels of either. This is all a matter of public record.

NATIONAL TOXICOLOGY PROGRAM LINKS HIGHER FLUORIDE WITH LOWER IQS IN CHILDREN

In August, 2024, after seven years of intensive study and unprecedented peer review, the National Toxicology Program (NTP) - the nation's highest level scientific review committee - published its report on fluoride's neurotoxicity- brain damage. https://ntp.niehs.nih.gov/sites/default/files/2024-08/fluoride_final_508.pdf

The review found that fluoride at levels of 1.5 mg/L in water or higher was consistently associated with lower IQs in children.

Seventy-two human studies were reviewed, with the large majority finding neurotoxicity. <u>Eighteen out of the 19 highest-quality linked higher fluoride levels with lower IQs, including several with pregnant women at levels in fluoridated water.</u>

The neurotoxicity wasn't limited to lower IQs. In additional studies rated high-quality, eight of nine examining other cognitive or neurodevelopmental outcomes associated fluoride with harm.

Fluoridated water is targeted at 0.7 mg/L, half the level that NTP consistently linked to lower IQs. Fluoridation promoters use this as a justification to continue to assert that fluoridation is safe for everyone, ignoring these facts:

- The NTP report never said fluoridation was safe, far different than the certainty of no harm claimed by promoters.
- 2. Drinking about twice the average amount of fluoridated water at 0.7 mg/L - approximately two liters per day - is the equivalent of 1.5 mg/L of fluoride consistently linked to lower IQs. How many thousands of pregnant women and children in Hillsboro drink that much?
- In addition to tap water, the vast majority of children and adults swallow <u>additional fluoride</u> through juices, soda, coffee, tea and food processed with fluoridated water. It's the dose that makes the poison.

It's hard to believe, but the major fluoridation promoters - the CDC, American Dental Association and American Academy of

Retired EPA Senior Scientist Opposes Fluoridation

My name is Dr. William Hirzy, PhD. As a chemist, I've been involved in environmental and health risk assessment for 46 years. In the EPA as a senior scientist, I thoroughly evaluated the supposed benefits of fluoride and the developing science on its toxicity.

There is no doubt in my mind that fluoridation's major health risks far outweigh any minimal (if any) benefits. The EPA Headquarters scientists' union concurred, voting in 1997 to officially support a California citizen's petition to ban fluoridation in that state.

Unfortunately, the management at the EPA has consistently refused to acknowledge the rapidly growing body of scientific evidence documenting these health risks. Other agencies in the federal government, including the CDC, are just as negligent in ignoring or downplaying these studies.

We've known about fluoride's toxicity for many years. In 2006, the National Research Council, led by a blue ribbon committee of 12 scientists, published Fluoride in Drinking Water, the most comprehensive review ever done. While NRC wasn't charged with taking a position on fluoridation itself, it identified numerous health risks linked with fluoride, including hypothyroidism, diabetes, pineal gland damage, IQ loss, bone fractures, fluorosis and others. The EPA was supposed to follow up with regulatory changes to address these risks. Instead, it has done nothing.

In response, a coalition non-profit environmental and health organizations and individuals sued the EPA, (Food and Water Watch et al vs. Environmental Protection Agency) in federal court, a case that is still ongoing as of this writing. They focused on the overwhelming evidence of irreversible brain damage in children. Indeed, 18 out of the 19 highest-quality studies in a National Toxicology Program systematic review linked higher fluoride with significantly lowered IQ, several at levels in fluoridated water.

It is obvious fluoridation can't be declared safe. It is equally obvious it constitutes a major risk to our health.

I strongly urge you to vote NO.

Argument in Opposition DENTISTS OPPOSED TO WATER FLUORIDATION

As dentists in our region, we want what's best for our patients, preventing cavities and supporting overall health.

Many of you have heard that water fluoridation is "safe and effective."

In fact, it's neither.

The most recent, highest-quality studies have determined that fluoridation has little, if any, effectiveness.

The Cochrane Collaboration is considered the gold standard of evaluating effectiveness of health practices. Its 2024 review analyzed data from the 21 highest-quality studies. It determined that fluoridation reduced cavities in permanent teeth by only 3%, not even statistically significant. It also found no sufficient evidence that fluoridation benefitted low-income families.

The 2024 LOTUS review in England surveyed 6.4 million people, the largest study ever done. It found only a tiny 2% lower cavity rate in permanent teeth by drinking fluoridated water, and also didn't find evidence that it helped low-income families.

Even the American Dental Association's outdated, very questionable claim that fluoridation reduces cavities 25%, equates to only half a cavity per child. And there is a scientific consensus that fluoride's effectiveness is mainly topical, not swallowed.

Finally, **World Health Association data** comparing cavity rates in children from developed fluoridated and unfluoridated nations found no difference at all.

But even if fluoridation was twice or three times as effective, it still wouldn't be justified because it's linked to the risk of so many harmful health effects. These include dental fluorosis, which is not just a cosmetic issue, but can cause structural damage to the enamel. Fluoride is also linked to hypothyroidism, kidney disease, bone fractures and loss of children's IQ.

<u>We advocate safe alternatives that actually work</u> – proper nutrition, brushing and flossing at home, and increased access to professional dental care.

Obviously, as dental professionals, we're dedicated to preventing cavities for both children and adults. But we also recognize teeth are only a small part of the overall health picture with fluoridation.

As far back as 2006, the National Research Council authoritative review of 1,100 scientific studies, Fluoride in Drinking Water, linked fluoride with numerous risks to human health. These included lowered IQ, hypothyroidism, bone fractures, kidney disease, fluorosis, diabetes and others. Every year since then, more published, peer-reviewed studies have shown that fluoride - at levels in fluoridated water - can pose significant health risks.

Moreover, <u>a wealth of scientific data show fluoridation has little</u>, if any, effectiveness.

There is a consensus, including the CDC, that fluoride's efficacy is mainly topical, not from swallowing. The Cochrane Collaboration, considered the world's gold standard on health interventions, found no statistically different decrease in cavities with fluoridation and no significant evidence it benefitted low-income families. And according to World Health Organization data, cavity rates in children in developed nations with fluoridation averaged the same as those in developed nations without fluoridation.

The vast majority of towns, cities and nations in the world have wisely rejected fluoridation. We urge Hillsboro to do the same.

For children under six, it says that they should use a pea-sized amount and "if more than used for brushing is accidentally swallowed, get medical help or contact a Poison Control Center right away." This or similar wording, required by the FDA, which defines and regulates all drugs, shows how toxic fluoride itself can be when ingested.

There is also a consensus that fluoride works primarily topically, not by being swallowed, so there isn't even a meaningful benefit from drinking fluoridated water.

OCA supports <u>effective</u> solutions that address the root causes of dental health problems, such as improved diets that limit processed foods and sugar-laden drinks.

While other chemicals are added to public water to disinfect it, artificial fluoridation chemicals are the only chemicals added to public water that are used as a drug to treat the customer, not the water. Fluoridation is practiced on every citizen without their consent or consideration to the customer's age, weight, daily water intake or pre-existing health conditions.

Moms Against Fluoridation is fighting to protect citizens' water from being drugged with a toxic, spent chemical that is now known to cause significant, adverse health impacts on the body.

Over the last 40 years, the science around chemical fluoridation has grown and it is now known that the hazards it presents to human health are significant. They include IQ loss in children, to thyroid gland dysfunction, arthritis and chemical hypersensitivity that can cause immediate and chronic pain and suffering. Water supplies should not be used for indiscriminate drug distribution. Every person has a right to clean, uncontaminated water. To protect choice and promote health we oppose artificial chemical fluoridation.

FLUORIDATED WATER SERIOUSLY HARMED MY SON -AND THE SCIENCE BACKS IT UP

I first became aware of fluoride's harm to my son Kyle when he was 14 years old. Kyle has autism and is now 39. In his early teens, Kyle suffered profound and chronic pain that resulted in wild, erratic behaviors, plus neuropathy in his extremities and other symptoms. It broke my heart to see him in agony. His pain-induced behaviors had a dramatic impact at home and at school.

We took Kyle to eight doctors over 15 months---none could find a cause, let alone a cure.

Then, two different moms of children with autism, one in Beaverton, suggested I try taking Kyle off fluoridated water. They knew what all these doctors didn't.

<u>I switched to fluoride-free water and Kyle's pain</u> <u>dramatically reduced in 3 days</u>. His behavior --screaming, jumping, sweating, heart pounding, racing wildly---was no longer the norm after that.

Children and adults on the autism spectrum have reactions to chemicals more frequently and more intensely than the general population. Kyle is so sensitive to even tiny amounts of fluoride that he cannot shower in fluoridated water without resulting in headache pain. Water that is chlorinated, but not fluoridated, produces no negative reactions for him.

Personal stories like mine have recently been validated by a major study (Malin et al 2024) in Los Angeles that linked fluoridated water with several neurobehavioral problems, including emotional reactivity, anxiety, depression, somatic complaints such as headaches, and symptoms linked to autism. It was the 10th consecutive study funded by the National Institutes of Health documenting harmful effects of fluoride on children's developing brains - especially IQ loss - many of them at levels in fluoridated water.

Fluoridation promoters insist it's been proven completely safe for everyone. They won't acknowledge real-life experiences or the science

Fluoridated Water and Migraine Headaches – A Personal Story

I believe those who support water fluoridation are well meaning and wish to help communities. I even voted in favor of it when I lived in Orange County, CA.

But any minimal benefits to teeth are far exceeded by serious health problems it contributes to. As with any medication, there are risks, especially for vulnerable populations. We each have unique medical histories and fluoridation ignores them with a one size fits all solution.

In my personal experience, water fluoridation contributed to years of suffering from migraine headaches.

I was diagnosed with migraines more than 30 years ago. I had tried every kind of treatment you can think of, but none were more than minimally effective. These headaches never really went away. I suffered near constant pain, nausea and dizziness. Then a friend suggested I try not drinking fluoridated water. I was amazed. Within days, the migraine symptoms diminished and then, after about three weeks, disappeared. Moreover, the ongoing skin rashes and bladder urgency I had suffered also disappeared. My quality of life has improved immeasurably since I stopped drinking fluoridated water in 2013.

Unfortunately, most doctors and dentists have no idea about fluoridation's risks for people like me, even though the National Academy of Sciences cited studies as far back as 2006 showing that about 1% of the population is vulnerable from chemical sensitivity. This means that at least 1,000 people in Hillsboro would suffer harm from hypersensitivity alone, and there are many other harms linked to fluoridation, such as hypothyroidism and IQ loss in children.

This isn't right. I can afford expensive filters and bottled water to avoid fluoride, but that's not an option for low-income families. They have no choice.

Fluoridation supporters say it's safe for everyone. I can say conclusively, based on my own experience, that this is wrong.

For your health and your city's health, I strongly urge a <u>no</u> vote on fluoridation.

I USED TO SUPPORT FLUORIDATION - NO MORE

My background is in non-profit health management. I worked for the American Cancer Society for 21 years, the last five as CEO of the Oregon chapter, then seven years as the safe food program director for the Oregon Physicians for Social Responsibility before retiring.

For most of my life I supported fluoridation. Without questioning, I trusted its main promoters, the CDC and American Dental Association (ADA). <u>Unfortunately, I had misplaced my trust</u>.

Fourteen years ago, I was asked to research the science. I soon discovered that hundreds of studies linked fluoride to numerous health risks, including, among others, hypothyroidism, diabetes, kidney disease, bone fractures, fluorosis and hypersensitivity that caused suffering from many symptoms.

Armed with this new information, I changed my mind. I became so concerned about fluoridation's toxicity that I now volunteer full-time with a large nationwide group of physicians, scientists and dentists to end this ill-advised practice.

The long-awaited systematic review of studies from the National Toxicology Program (NTP) was just published in August. It determined that fluoride is a neurotoxin linked to lower IQs in children, often at levels at or near fluoridated water. A lawsuit against the EPA for allowing fluoridation (Food and Water Watch et al vs EPA), based on these same studies, just ended. We're awaiting the federal court to rule if fluoridation is an unreasonable risk to human health.

The CDC, EPA and ADA position is, essentially, that if you haven't proven fluoridation is harmful, they're going to continue promoting it. **This is backwards.** The common sense position is that if you haven't proved it's safe, it shouldn't be started. And obviously, with the latest NTP report on lowered IQs - and hundreds of other studies on other diseases linked to fluoride - there is far more evidence it's harmful than it's safe.

The proverb "Better safe than sorry" has never been more appropriate.

Hazardous Material Specialist Opposes Water Fluoridation

My wife, three young children and I have lived in Hillsboro almost 16 years. I have a Ph.D. in Electrical Engineering from the University of Illinois and work in manufacturing and supply chains. I routinely manage hazardous materials and take environmental and human safety seriously.

<u>I can assure you that the chemical typically used to fluoridate</u> water, fluorosilicic acid, is one of those hazardous materials.

As I worked with these materials in graduate school and into my professional career, I learned more about the danger of many of them. Scientifically outdated statements by the medical establishment pronouncing substances safe are often wrong. For years, we were told leaded paint, leaded gas, asbestos, DDT and Agent Orange were all safe, to name just a few examples.

This is how dangerous this chemical is. From the publicly available Safety Data Sheets (SDS) on fluorosilicic acid:

- · Advises against using this as a drug
- Is considered hazardous by OSHA
- Causes severe skin burns and eye damage
- Workers at water treatment plants need to wear full body protective gear due to its corrosive nature
- Explicitly states that it should not be flushed into surface water or sanitary systems.

Separate NSF certification reports shows it can contain <u>lead</u> and arsenic. Although under the legal limits, <u>there are no known safe levels for either in humans.</u>

Proponents claim that fluorosilicic acid is diluted enough to be safe. <u>But this argument is scientifically unsound.</u> It's impossible to monitor how much people drink, especially infants and young children who proportionately drink a much higher amount compared to body weight – <u>the dose makes the poison.</u>

In August, the National Toxicology Program officially cited fluoride as a known neurotoxin that lowers childrens' IQs.

Is this a chemical we want to put into Hillsboro's clean, safe water?

Not for my kids. Not for yours. And not for anybody, young or old. Please vote no on Measure 34-338.

- x establish a dropsite without displaying a sign stating "Not An Official Ballot Dropsite"

Any violations of the identified election laws are subject to penalties ranging from Civil Penalties (Up to \$250 per violation), Class A Misdemeanors or Class C Felonies.

Ballot Title

City of Forest Grove Home Rule Charter

Question: Shall the City of Forest Grove amend the existing charter?

Summary: This measure would update the city's existing home rule charter. The Oregon Constitution gives city voters the right to adopt and amend charters. Charters grant legal authority to cities and assign duties to city officials. Forest Grove voters last amended the current charter in 2009.

The proposed charter amendments include updating the description of the mayor's duties (section 8); updating the reasons that may create a Council vacancy and clarifying and updating the process for appointments to vacant positions (sections 31 and 32); amending the start date of each officer's term and procedures for Council action (sections 16, 19, 22 and 29); and removing the city manager residency requirement (section 33).

This measure was referred to the voters by the City Council based on recommendations of the Charter Review Committee.

Explanatory Statement

If approved, this measure would amend the City's current charter. The new charter would update the current charter that Forest Grove voters adopted in 2009. The proposed charter amendments are based on the work of the City's 2023-2024 Charter Review Committee. The Committee included the following individuals:

The City Council approved submitting the amended charter to voters for approval. The Oregon Constitution gives city voters the right to adopt home rule charters. A charter grants legal authority to a city government and defines the roles and responsibilities of city officials.

Specific amendments from the existing charter to new charter include:

- Updating the description of the mayor's duties (section 8) to replace the description of the mayor as serving as the City's "political head" with the mayor serving as the "primary representative of the Council for the City." This amendment is not intended to substantively impact the mayor's duties, but rather to better reflect the mayor's role as an apolitical Council and city representative.
- Updating the reasons that may create a Council vacancy to include any conviction for a misdemeanor or felony offense (section 31).
- Clarifying and updating the process for appointments to vacant positions (section 32). These proposed amendments include allowing any remaining Councilors to fill vacant Council positions even if the number of remaining Councilors falls below the charter's quorum and voting requirements.

Because the current charter does not address this issue, if the number of remaining Councilors falls below the quorum (or four seated Councilors), state law requires the City either conduct a special

election to seat enough Councilors to reach the quorum or, if there are no remaining Councilors, state law requires the Washington County Board of Commissioners to appoint four Councilors. These solutions under state law create delay and expense for the City, and may impact local control. The proposed charter amendments allow the remaining Councilors to immediately appoint a sufficient number of Councilors to conduct other city business.

The proposed amendments also limit an appointed Councilor's term length only to the next general election, rather than the remaining term of the vacating Councilor.

- Replacing the word "disability" with "a physical or mental impairment" to clarify when the Council may appoint a Councilor protem for a member who is unable to attend Council meetings (section 32).
- Removing the city manager residency requirement to allow for more flexibility in the recruitment and selection of city managers (section 33).
- Amending the start date of each officer's term and procedures for Council action (sections 16, 19, 22 and 29).

Measure No. 34-340

Ballot Title

Amends Charter to Allow Council to Use Travel Rewards Benefits

Question: Shall Council be permitted to use rewards programs while conducting the City's business?

Summary: City councilors presently receive no compensation for performance of their duties. The Sherwood City Charter would be amended to allow councilors to retain and apply benefits accrued through rewards programs if they use personal accounts to conduct City business. Allowing councilors to use rewards programs can at times provide discounts on travel and accommodations which can reduce the expense to the City. The charter currently states, "the mayor and councilors shall not be compensated but may be reimbursed for actual and reasonable expenses." The Sherwood employee handbook allows employees to retain any benefit from their travel rewards programs for their personal use. The Charter would be amended to state, "The mayor and councilors may be compensated for expenses incurred while conducting the City's business using the same standard that applies to city employees. This will be the council's official compensation package and only compensation."

This measure leaves certain terms undefined, which City Council may define in an implementing ordinance.

Explanatory Statement

The proposed charter amendment would permit the mayor and city councilors to use travel rewards programs as their official compensation package.

Sherwood's Charter states, "The mayor and councilors shall not be compensated but may be reimbursed for actual and reasonable expenses." Reimbursement of expenses that are currently authorized is limited only to those expenses personally paid while conducting the public body's business.

In a 2022 stipulated final order by the Oregon Government Ethics Commission, the Commission considered one official's use of airline and hotel membership rewards points a possible misuse of his official position. However, Oregon ethics laws state that public officials may accept any financial benefit that is identified by the public body they serve as part of the official compensation package of the public official. The phrase official compensation package includes the direct payment of a public official's expenses by the public body, in accordance with the public body's policies. The City of Sherwood recognizes that use of rewards memberships often saves the City money, and accordingly, it allows its employees to keep those rewards under their official compensation package.

This amendment to the City's Charter would make direct payment of the mayor and councilors' expenses incurred while conducting the City's business their official compensation package, including allowing them to use travel rewards programs.

Measure No. 34-341

Ballot Title

Levy Renewal to Retain TTSD Teachers and Preserve Classroom Programs

Question: Shall District retain teachers/programs by renewing current levy taxes (\$1 per \$1,000 of assessed value) for five years, beginning 2025?

Summary: This measure is not a new or added tax.

It simply continues the current local option levy, which voters passed in 2000 and then renewed in 2004, 2008, 2014, and 2018. Renewing the levy again would keep the existing levy rate for another five years, beginning in 2025-26 when the current levy expires.

Renewal of the local option levy would continue funding for a level of program offerings, staffing, and class sizes that wouldn't be possible without it. The levy renewal would:

- continue funding for approximately 100 teachers and the classroom programs they provide
- support class sizes funded by the current levy
- help local schools by supplementing insufficient state funding

The local option levy rate would not exceed \$1 per \$1,000 of assessed value. The levy is estimated to raise \$12,600,000 in 2025-26, \$13,000,000 in 2026-27, \$13,400,000 in 2027-28, \$13,800,000 in 2028-29, and \$14,200,000 in 2029-30, for a total of \$67,000,000 over five years.

Explanatory Statement

These questions and answers summarize this measure.

1. What is the local option levy renewal?

Tigard-Tualatin School District (TTSD) administers a local option levy to supplement dollars allocated through the state school fund. The current levy pays for 100 teaching positions and supports educational programs and class sizes.

Voters approved the local option levy in 2000 and renewed it in 2004, 2008, 2014, and 2018. Renewing again would keep the existing levy rate for another five years, beginning in 2025–26.

It is not a new or additional tax.

2. How would the funds be used?

Every local option levy dollar stays in the District. None goes to Salem. Renewing the local option levy would:

- fund approximately 100 current teachers who work in every school in the District;
- preserve classroom programs that support a well-rounded education for every TTSD student;
- support class sizes;
- supplement state funding to maintain school services and operations.

3. What would happen if this levy is not renewed?

The levy funds a level of programs, staffing, and class sizes that wouldn't be possible without it.

If the renewal were to fail to pass, TTSD would no longer receive levy funds. That would reduce the budget by approximately \$12,600,000 in 2025–26, which could increase class sizes and reduce funding for staff and classroom programs.

4. Is this measure within the limits established by Ballot Measure 5?

Yes. The local option levy rate is calculated individually for each piece of property, so the rate stays within Measure 5 limits.

5. How much would this cost?

If the renewal measure passes, it will continue the existing levy rate for another five years. It is not a new or additional tax.

The exact amount varies from property to property. For a home assessed at \$300,000 and taxed at the maximum levy rate (\$1 per \$1,000 of assessed value), the cost would continue to be \$300 per year, or about \$25 per month.

6. What accountability measures are in place?

Each year, an outside accounting firm audits TTSD finances and expenditures. All audit reports are public.

The school district's budget is reviewed and approved by an 11-member committee that includes the five elected school board members and six appointed community members.

Another three community members serve with two school board members on the District's Financial Oversight Committee, which meets with auditors to review TTSD's audit plan and results, and with the District's investment advisors to review the policy and strategy for investments.

7. What about budget savings and efficiencies?

Evidence of the District's commitment to fiscally responsible stewardship includes:

- · successful financial audits every year
- · monthly financial reports to the Board
- transparency in reporting
- ongoing commitment to sustaining budget reserves and a "rainyday fund"

In the 2023–24 school year, TTSD redirected savings to preserve teaching positions wherever possible. Long-term dedication to savings enabled TTSD to avoid cutting school days and mitigate reductions to programs. The District kept all its programs — none were eliminated.


