

Request for Proposals for Project Applications

FY2024 HUD Continuum of Care (CoC) Program Local Funding Competition

A. OVERVIEW

The Continuum of Care (CoC) Program is a federal initiative that provides funding to support community efforts to end homelessness. The purpose of this Request for Proposals (RFP) is to invite project applications for Washington County's local funding competition for CoC Program funds.

On July 31, 2024, the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) released the Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) for the Fiscal Year (FY) 2024 CoC Funding Competition. As the Collaborative Applicant for the Washington County CoC, Washington County's Department of Housing Services invites new and renewal project applications to be considered for potential funding.

Project sponsors are invited to submit proposals to provide housing with supportive services in the following categories:

- Permanent Supportive Housing (PH-PSH)
- Rapid Re-Housing (PH-RRH)

Organizations that have not previously applied for CoC Program funding, as well as currently funded organizations, are encouraged to submit proposals for new projects. This RFP also serves as notice for existing CoC Program-funded projects of the deadline to submit applications for renewal of CoC project funding.

Funding for new projects under this RFP will come from HUD CoC Bonus and DV Bonus funds as well as any resources made available via reallocation of current CoC Program funds.

All proposals will be evaluated to determine which projects will be included in the Washington County CoC's FY2024 CoC Program Competition application to HUD. Proposals should demonstrate the project's alignment with the specific funding priorities described in this RFP and the evaluation criteria described in the CoC Program Application Rating and Ranking Process.

Project sponsors seeking to apply for funding are encouraged to carefully review the HUD <u>FY2024</u> <u>CoC Program Competition: Notice of Funding Opportunity</u> (referred to throughout this RFP as "HUD NOFO").

B. FUNDING GUIDELINES FOR NEW PROJECTS

All projects must adhere to the overall funding guidelines provided by HUD in the FY2024 CoC Program Competition: Notice of Funding Opportunity. In addition, the Washington County CoC has established specific priorities within HUD's guidelines for the local funding competition for new project proposals.

Eligible Applicants:

Eligible project applicants include legally incorporated nonprofit organizations, public housing authorities, Indian Tribes and Tribally Designated Housing Entities, other government entities, and faith-based organizations. For-profit entities and individuals are not eligible. Project applicants must demonstrate the financial and management capacity and expertise to implement the project and administer HUD funds in alignment with federal requirements.

Eligible Projects:

CoC Bonus

Applicants can apply for CoC Bonus funding for new projects in the following categories:

- Permanent Supportive Housing (PH-PSH)
- Rapid Re-Housing (PH-RRH)

DV Bonus

Applicants can apply for DV Bonus funding for new Rapid Re-Housing (PH-RRH) projects serving survivors of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, or stalking that are defined as homeless. Applicants considering applying for DV Bonus funding should email Homeless_Services@washingtoncountyor.gov for additional details on requirements.

All projects must be located in Washington County.

Funding Priorities:

Funding will be prioritized for projects that increase Washington County's system capacity for Permanent Supportive Housing and/or Rapid Re-Housing and support permanent housing placement and retention.

Additional points will be awarded for projects that align with one or more of the following priorities:

- Projects that support shelter participants to transition to permanent housing as quickly as possible, reducing the length of time that people experience homelessness.
- Projects that are specifically focused on helping people transition from unsheltered homelessness to permanent housing.
- Projects that address and resolve disparities for Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders in housing program outcomes.

Bonus Points:

Additional points will be awarded to new project proposals that demonstrate formal coordination with housing and/or health care providers. This includes:

- Projects with a documented commitment of housing subsidies not funded through the federal CoC or Emergency Solutions Grants (ESG) programs for at least 25% of the units or participants.
- Projects with a written commitment from a health care organization to provide access to (a) treatment or recovery services for all program participants who qualify, or (b) health care services to program participants equal to at least 25% of the funding being requested for the project.

Match Requirement:

All new project proposals must demonstrate cash or in-kind match of at least 25% of all proposed grant funds other than leasing funds. All costs paid for with matching funds must be activities that are eligible under the CoC Program. Matching funds may be from public or private sources.

Funding Uses:

Eligible uses of HUD CoC funding include leasing, operating costs, rental assistance, supportive services, and administrative costs, all within applicable guidelines. Washington County has generally found that, of the various funding sources available to our community, HUD CoC funds are most effectively utilized for leasing and rental assistance costs. New project applicants are therefore encouraged to focus their funding requests on leasing and rental assistance. The Washington County Department of Housing Services will work with applicants to fund supportive services (if needed in addition to resources the applicant commits as part of the 25% match requirement) for any new project proposals that receive HUD CoC funding for leasing or rent assistance.

While HUD CoC funding can be used for capital costs, no funds are available under this RFP for capital costs (i.e., new construction, acquisition, or rehabilitation).

Project Requirements:

All HUD CoC-funded projects must meet the following requirements:

- Projects must use a Housing First approach, including no preconditions or barriers to entry and provision of necessary supports to maintain housing and prevent a return to homelessness.
- Projects are required to participate in the local Coordinated Entry system (Community Connect)
 and Homeless Management Information System (or a comparable database for domestic violence
 providers such as Osnium).

Projects should also align with the local CoC's rating criteria listed in the appendix of the CoC Program Application Rating and Ranking Process.

Funding Available:

The Washington County CoC is eligible to apply for approximately \$598,000 for one or more projects funded through CoC Bonus funds. In addition, the CoC is eligible to apply for approximately \$360,500 in DV Bonus funds. Applicants to the local funding competition can submit project budgets up to these amounts.

Grant Terms:

Proposals are for the 2025-26 funding year. Grant terms will generally begin in mid to late 2025 and must begin before the end of 2025. The grant term for new project applications except those funded through DV Bonus funds may be 1 year, 2 years, 3 years, 4 years, 5 years, or 15 years, depending on the type of assistance requested. Washington County encourages applications for 1-year grant terms (with an initial grant term of up to 18 months) to maximize the available funding since the total available funding is divided by the number of years in the grant term. New projects funded with DV Bonus funds may only request a 1-year grant term (with an initial grant term of up to 18 months). Funded projects are eligible to apply for annual renewal funding. For more details on HUD's guidelines for grant terms, see pages 56-57 of the HUD NOFO.

Funding Structure:

To reduce the administrative burden on grantees, Washington County is the direct recipient of funds for most CoC projects, and the project sponsors are subrecipients. Any new CoC-funded projects will follow this structure.

C. APPLICATION PROCESS FOR NEW PROJECTS

The CoC application process has two parts: a local competition and a national competition. This RFP solicits proposals for the local competition, which is used to select the proposals that will be submitted to HUD as part of Washington County's application for the national competition.

The local funding competition for new projects includes several steps:

- 1. **Application to local competition:** Applicants must complete and submit a New Project Proposal Form by 5:00 p.m. on Wednesday, September 4, 2024.
- 2. **Response to clarifying questions:** Applicants may be asked to respond to clarifying questions about their proposals via email the week of September 16, with responses due on September 19.
- 3. Scoring of applications: Applications will be evaluated and scored by the Washington County

- CoC's Equitable Procurement Subcommittee. See Addendum A for the evaluation criteria and scoring rubric that will be used for all new project proposals.
- **4. Selection for submission to HUD:** Based on the scores, the Equitable Procurement Subcommittee will select one or more of the applications for submission to HUD. (The number of applications selected for submission will depend on the project budgets and available funding.)
- **5. HUD CoC e-snaps application:** Application(s) selected for submission to HUD must work with Washington County CoC staff to complete HUD's CoC New Project Application in e-snaps (HUD's online application portal) in early-to-mid October.
- 6. **Submission to HUD:** Inclusion in the CoC's application to HUD does not guarantee that a project will receive funding. Funding decisions are made by HUD based on various criteria including the CoC's overall application and the project's ranking in relation to the other new and renewal projects included in the CoC's application.

D. APPLICATION PROCESS FOR RENEWAL PROJECTS

All current CoC Program-funded projects seeking to renew their CoC funding are required to work with Washington County to submit renewal applications as part of the 2024 CoC Program Competition. The following projects are eligible for renewal:

- Clover Court, New Narrative
- CoC Rapid Re-Housing for Families, Community Action
- Enhanced Support for Permanent Housing, Just Compassion
- Hillsboro Graduated Independent Living Program, New Narrative
- Reentry Housing, New Narrative
- Shelter Plus Care Renewal, Washington County Department of Housing Services
- Sojourner's House Combined, Domestic Violence Resource Center
- Transitional Living Program, Boys and Girls Aid

Washington County will contact each renewal project directly with instructions for the renewal application process. The deadline for submitting the requested renewal project application materials to Washington County is 8/19/24.

The ranking of renewal project applications for submission to HUD will follow the process and criteria outlined in the <u>CoC Program Application Rating and Ranking Process</u>.

Addendum B: Bonus Points

HUD will award additional points to CoCs that submit new project applications in the CoC Bonus category that leverage health care and/or housing resources in accordance with the following guidelines.

Leveraging Health Care Resources

Bonus points are available for new Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH) or Rapid Re-Housing (RRH) projects that leverage health care resources through formal partnerships with health care organizations. Eligible sources of health care resources include:

- Direct contributions from a public or private health insurance provider to the project (e.g., Medicaid), and
- Provision of health care services by a private or public organization tailored to the program participants of the project.

The health care resource commitment must be in the form of services that will be provided to program participants in the housing portion of the project. Health care services include treatment for physical health, mental health, and/or substance use disorders.

Eligibility for the project must comply with HUD program requirements and cannot be restricted by the eligibility requirements of the health care provider.

The project application must include a written commitment from the health care organization that:

- In the case of a substance use disorder treatment or recovery provider, it will provide access to treatment or recovery services for all program participants who qualify and choose those services; or
- The value of assistance being provided (and funded by the health care organization) is at least an amount that is equivalent to 25% of the funding being requested from HUD for the project.

Leveraging Housing Resources

Bonus points are available for new PSH or RRH projects that utilize housing subsidies or subsidized housing units not funded through the CoC or ESG programs. Eligible sources of housing resources include those funded by private organizations, state or local government, public housing agencies, faith-based organizations, or federal programs other than the CoC or ESG programs.

The project application must include written documentation of the number of subsidies or units being provided to support the project, demonstrating that these units will:

- In the case of a PSH project, provide at least 25% of the units included in the project; or
- In the case of a RRH project, serve at least 25% of the program participants anticipated to be served by the project.
