

Equitable Procurement Subcommittee Overview



- Input on procurement processes and contracts
- Complete the annual Rating and Ranking process required by HUD as a part of the HUD Notice of Funding Opportunity process, recommend projects for inclusion in the annual HUD CoC Application, and approve the final application for submission to HUD
- Membership CANNOT include any provider of services who receives or intends to apply for funding by HUD or Washington County, any participant of such providers, or any other person with a specific relationship to one of these providers (such as a member of their board or staff)
- To be convened at least twice annually



Continuum of Care Program Competition



- Federal grant competition administered by US Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD)
- Washington County Department of Housing Services is the Collaborative Applicant for the local CoC (OR-506CoC)
- HUD typically releases the Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) for the annual competition in early July
- Washington County will be eligible to apply for about \$5.5 million
 - ➤ All current grants are eligible to apply for renewal funding
 - > Each CoC is eligible to apply for a designated amount in new funding each year
- Local competition is guided by an Application and Award Policy approved by the Solutions Council



CoC Local Competition Process



- 1. Local RFP is released once HUD releases the CoC NOFO
- 2. New project applicants submit written proposals
- 3. Renewal projects work with County to submit renewal applications
- 4. County completes ratings worksheets for renewal projects based on performance and monitoring data
- 5. Equitable Procurement Subcommittee scores the new project proposals based on written proposals and/or presentations
- 6. Equitable Procurement Subcommittee ranks all new and renewal project applications
- 7. Highest ranking projects are selected for submission to HUD

Discussion #1: New Project Scoring Process



Option A: no presentations

- Committee members review applications on their own time and submit scores electronically
- Committee meets to rank all new and renewal projects based on scores

Option B: presentations

- Committee meets to receive presentations and submits scores immediately after the meeting based on the presentations
- Committee meets to rank all new and renewal projects based on scores



→ Sample Timeline from 2023



7/5/23	HUD CoC NOFO released
7/10/23	Washington County RFP for local funding competition released
7/31/23	Submission deadline for all new and renewal project applications
8/2/23	New project applicants present new project proposals at HSSN meeting
9/8/23	CoC Board performs project rating, ranking and selection
9/12/23	Project applicants are notified of the selection or denial of applications
9/22/23	CoC Consolidated Application is posted online for public review and comment period
9/26/23	Washington County submits the CoC Consolidated Application prior to HUD's 9/28/23 deadline
1/29/24	HUD notifies the CoC of the results of the funding competition

Option A: no presentations

- Committee members review applications on their own time and submit scores electronically

- Committee meets to receive presentations and submits scores immediately after the meeting based on the presentations
- Committee meets to rank all new and renewal projects based on scores

Project Ranking



Renewals

- Ranked based on the ratings
- HMIS is not scored so is put in position #1

1st year renewals

- No performance data to score
- Automatically placed after the other renewals and not eligible for reallocation

New projects

- New project applications are ranked separately based on their ratings
- Ratings are not based on performance, so not comparable to the renewal project ratings
- Historically placed after the renewals
- Option of placing one or more new project applications higher in the rankings for strategic reasons as long as the rank order of the new project applications is maintained

Funding Tiers



The reason why we are required to rank projects is because HUD allocates funding in tiers:

Tier 1:

- In 2023: 93% of amount needed to fully fund all renewal projects.
- Projects in Tier 1 are very likely to be funded.

Tier 2:

- Remaining funding the CoC is eligible to apply for (not including CoC Planning grant).
- Whether projects in Tier 2 are funded depends on the CoC Consolidated Application score and their rank.
- If a project straddles Tier 1 and Tier 2, HUD will fund the Tier 1 portion and may or may not fund the Tier 2 portion.



Reallocating Project Funds



CoC Reallocation Policy:

- Reallocation may be used to shift funds from low-performing and less needed renewal projects to create one or more new projects.
- The decision to reallocate is based on the CoC Board's determination of whether the lowest scoring projects are still needed based on an assessment of performance, system priorities, and current needs and gaps.
- Decisions to reallocate should take into account the risk of displacing current program participants.

Funding Available for New Projects



CoC Bonus (estimate: \$350,000)

- Permanent Supportive Housing
- Rapid Re-Housing

DV Bonus (estimate: \$250,000)

For projects serving survivors of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, or stalking

Rapid Re-Housing



Local Funding Priorities



Funding prioritized for projects that:

- Increase Washington County's system capacity for Permanent Supportive Housing and/or Rapid Re-Housing, and
- Support permanent housing placement and retention.

Additional points for projects that:

- Support shelter participants to transition to permanent housing as quickly as possible, reducing the length of time that people experience homelessness,
- Are specifically focused on helping people transition from unsheltered homelessness to permanent housing, and/or
- Address and resolve disparities for Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders in housing program outcomes.

Bonus points awarded by HUD and in the local competition for new projects that include partnerships with health care and/or housing:

- Health care: Commitment from a health care organization to provide access to:
 - (a)treatment or recovery services for all program participants who qualify, or
 - (b)health care services to program participants equal to at least 25% of the funding being requested for the project.
- **Housing:** Housing subsidies not funded through the federal CoC or ESG programs for at least 25% of the units or participants.
